

YEAR END AWARD RULES (Last updated January 25, 2006)

The New Forest Pony Society of North America is proud to sponsor a year-end award program. There are many categories members can participate in to earn points toward year-end and lifetime achievement awards for registered pure-bred New Forest Ponies and cross-bred New Forest Ponies. To be considered for awards and lifetime achievement awards, the following rules must be adhered to.

1. Eligibility

A. Pure-bred Ponies must be registered with the New Forest Pony and Cattle Breeding Society and/or the New Forest Pony Association and Registry or New Forest Pony Society of North America and a copy of the registration papers must be submitted to the appropriate point secretary with the first show report. Cross-bred ponies must either be registered showing proof of New Forest ancestry, or have a breeder's statement attesting to New Forest ancestry. A copy of the registration or the breeder's statement must be submitted to the point secretary with the first show report. There is a point secretary for the U.S. and one for Canada. See the last page for names and addresses.

B. Owners, riders and handlers of ponies must be members in good standing of the New Forest Pony Society of North America with dues having been paid in full before the date of the event for the points to be counted. (See membership enrollment form for membership information.)

C. Year-end award points will be counted from January 1- December 31 of the current year. In the event a show opens before or closes after the point accumulation deadlines, the entire show will count in the same year. For example, if a show starts on December 31 and goes to January 3, the points will count in the year the show began.

2. Show Reports

A. Show reports must be completely filled out and mailed to the point secretary within 21 days of the end of the event. A copy of the pony's registration or breeder's statement must accompany the first report for the year.

B. A copy of the class list must be attached to each show report and must include the name, date and location of the event and any ratings given to the event (USAE or Equine Canada "AA, A, B or C" or unrated). If the rating is not stated clearly on the documentation sent in, or no documentation is included, only unrated points will be awarded.

C. Show reports must be legibly and completely filled out. Incomplete or late reports will not be counted.

D. Points for dressage will only be awarded if a copy of the page of the test is included, showing the score.

E. Junior exhibitors are under the age of 18 as of January 1. Juniors should include date of birth on each show report.

3. Point Scoring

- A. Points will be awarded based on placing, rating of show, and in the case of dressage, test score regardless of placing.
- B. Shows sanctioned by the following organizations will count as A, AA, B & C rated:
United States Equestrian Association, Equine Canada, Breed shows recognized by a national breed organization, United States Dressage Federation, United States Combined Training Association, American Driving Society. Proof of sanctioning must accompany show report.
- C. Dressage schooling shows will count as unrated.
- D. USCTA combined tests; events where only two phases are offered will count as unrated.
- E. Questions regarding rating should be directed to the point secretary.

Point Scoring Chart

Rated Show

- Champion - 18 points
- Reserve Champion - 16 points
- First Place - 12 points
- Second Place - 10 points
- Third Place - 7 points
- Fourth Place - 5 points
- Fifth Place - 3 points
- Sixth Place - 2 points

Unrated Show

- Champion - 12 points
- Reserve Champion - 10 points
- First Place - 6 points
- Second Place - 5 points
- Third Place - 4 points
- Fourth Place - 3 points
- Fifth Place - 2 points
- Sixth Place - 1 point

Points for dressage will be awarded according to percentage score, not placing.

Dressage % Point Scoring Chart

Rated Show

- 55.0-57.99% - 3 points
- 58.0-59.99% - 4 points
- 60.0-62.99% - 7 points
- 63.0-65.99% - 9 points
- 66.0-68.99% - 12 points
- 69.0-69.99% - 13 points

70% and above - 15 points

Schooling Show

55.0-57.99% - 1 point

58.0-59.99% - 2 points

60.0-62.99% - 5 points

63.0-65.99% - 7 points

66.0-68.99% - 10 points

69.0-69.99% - 12 points

70% and above - 13 points

4. Categories

A. Classes will be as described in the USAE or Equine Canada rulebook.

B. Points from a class may be counted in one category only. For example if placing occurs in a Hunter Equitation on the Flat class, points will be awarded in the hunter OR the equitation category, but not in both.

C. Category Definitions:

1. Hunter Junior Flat/OF: Rider must be under 18. To be counted in this category the class name must include the words Hunter, Hunter Seat or Jumper, Short Stirrup. To be ridden at the walk, trot and canter on the flat or over fences. Examples of classes included in this category are Children's Hunter Under Saddle, Low Hunter Over Fences.

2. Hunter Senior Flat/OF: Rider must be 18 or older. To be counted in this category the class name must include the words Hunter, Hunt Seat or Jumper. To be ridden at a walk, trot, and canter on the flat or over fences. Examples of classes included in this category are Open Working Hunter O/F, Pre-Green Hunter O/F, Open Hunt Seat Equitation, Schooling Hunter Under Saddle.

3. Leadline: Open to riders 8 years old and under.

4. English Pleasure/Equitation: This category is for classes ridden with an English saddle. To be ridden at a walk, trot and canter. Examples of classes that fall under this category are Pleasure Hack, Cross Country Pleasure, Bridle Path Hack, English Pleasure, English Equitation.

5. Western Pleasure/Equitation: This category is for classes ridden with a Western or Stock saddle. To be ridden at a walk, jog and lope. Examples of classes that fall under this category are Pleasure Hack, Bridle Path Hack, Western Pleasure, Western Equitation.

6. Walk-Trot Junior: Rider must be under 18. To be ridden at a walk and trot/jog only. Riders may not cross enter into any classes requiring a canter/lope at the same event.

7. Walt-Trot Adult: Rider must be 18 or older. To be ridden at a walk and trot/jog only. Riders may not cross enter into any classes requiring a canter/lope at the same show.

8. Trail; Classes ridden in the show ring where the pony and rider must complete a set of trail obstacles. English or Western tack.
9. Games/Costume; The category is for any class considered a game including Egg & Spoon, Sit A Buck, Gymkhana, Command, Barrels, Flags, Water Glass, or Discipline Rail. For costume classes the rider and pony must be dressed up, photos are requested, but not required.
10. Junior Halter: Exhibitor must be under 18. Pony to be shown in hand. Classes in this category include Junior Showmanship, Fitting and Showmanship, Model Horse/Pony, Halter.
11. Senior Halter: Exhibitor must be 18 or over. Pony to be shown in hand. Classes in this category include Junior Showmanship, Fitting and Showmanship, Model Horse/Pony, Halter.
12. Dressage: A dressage test must be ridden. A copy of the test page showing the score must accompany the show report form. Awards will be given for each level where there is participation from Intro through Grand Prix. Classes which can also be included in this category are Dressage Equitation Walk, Trot, Canter, and Suitable to Become a Dressage Pony Walk, Trot, Canter. (For these classes, points will be awarded based on placing.)
13. Combined Training, Eventing: This category is for 2-phase and 3-phase eventing and combined training events. Please submit placing for each phase, cross country, dressage and stadium jumping. Points will be awarded based on placing for each phase as well as overall. Three-phase events will count as A-rated points and 2-phase events will count as Unrated points.
14. Open Stadium Jumping: Submit documentation of show rating with show report form.
15. Pleasure Driving: This category is for classes driven in the show ring such as Open Pleasure Driving, Reinsmanship, Working Pony, Drive and Ride, Gentleman, Ladies or Juniors to Drive.
16. Obstacle Driving: This category is for classes driven through an obstacle course in the show ring and run against the clock. Examples of classes included in this category are Cones, Double Jeopardy, Reverse Psychology, Deliver the Mail, Cross Country Obstacles (may not be in the show ring.)
17. Combined Driving/Arena Driving; This category is for three-phase driving events which include a driven dressage test, cones and marathon/hazard course. Points will be awarded based on placing in each phase, as well as overall.
18. Driven Dressage: This category is for classes where a dressage test is driven. Points will be awarded based on placing.
19. Exhibition New Forest Pony; This category is for participation in demonstrations, breed pavilions at equine exhibitions or country fairs, where you are promoting the New Forest Pony breed. Six (6) points will be awarded for participation. If the same demonstration takes place more than once, 6 points will be awarded for each demonstration where the

audience changes. If you show more than one pony, each participating pony/handler combination will receive points.

20. Miscellaneous; This category covers anything not mentioned in the others including: Street parades (6 points per parade, photo required), Unjudged trail rides (6 points per day for organized events sponsored by a legitimate club or organization. A flyer, press release or other documentation of the organization of the ride must accompany the show report form). Competitive and Endurance Trail Rides (Points will be awarded according to the Rated point chart plus 6 participation points. Documentation confirming the organization of the event must accompany the show report form). Sidesaddle points will be awarded to any rider using a sidesaddle in any of the above categories and for classes specifically calling for a sidesaddle, but points can only count in one category ride. Cross Country, Hunter Pace, Fox Hunt (6 points will be awarded for participation in addition to points earned for placing. Organized events only to count, include documentation of organization with show report. Clinics will count for 3 points per day for organized events. Documentation must accompany show report form.

5. Special Awards- Trophies

A. High Point Pony Award will be given to the pony earning the highest number of points during the year. The pony may be shown by more than one exhibitor.

B. High Point Exhibitor Award will be given to the member accumulating the highest number of points during the year. Exhibitors may show more than one pony.

C. Most Versatile Pony Award will be given to the pony shown in the most categories representing different disciplines.

6. New Forest Pony Lifetime Achievement Awards

A. Ponies enrolled in the Lifetime Achievement Awards Program will earn awards as they accumulate show points from year to year. A pony achieves Bronze status at 250 points, Silver status at 500 points, Gold Status at 750 points, and Platinum status at 1000 points. NFPSNA Lifetime Achievement awards begin to accrue as of 2003.

B. To enroll a pony in this program, please send a check for \$20 to NFPSNA Secretary/Treasurer.

7. Sponsorships for Awards

A. Awards may be sponsored for \$15 each by anyone wishing to do so. Please indicate which award you would like to sponsor. There is nothing more encouraging than seeing the accomplishments of our lovable breed being recognized and rewarded.

B. Suggestions for additional awards are welcome provided sponsorships are forthcoming.

8. Presentation of Awards

- A. Points will be tallied by February 1 and awards will be mailed to the recipients by March 1.
- B. Winners are requested to send pictures for the newsletter once the awards are received.
- C. Winners will be listed in the newsletter.
- D. Point standings will be published in the newsletter periodically to keep you up-to-date during the year.

9. Point Secretaries

- A. The names, addresses, phone numbers and email address of the point secretaries are listed on the show report form. All forms must be sent to the point secretary for your country, U.S.A. if you reside in the U.S.A., and Canada if you reside in Canada.
